## Living Above the Fray

The fray is all the hassles, insecure moments, down-right raw deals, and crushed plans while living our lives on this earth. In the dictionary it means *"a noisy fight, a quarrel, a clash, a fistfight, and a knock-down-and-drag-out,* to name a few." One use means *"to be consumed gradually by reaction or friction."* 

For a believer who has committed to the Lordship of Jesus Christ the fray is what hinders the good fight of faith, (I Tim 6:12). We have been delivered from the <u>penalty</u> of sin, but when it comes to the <u>power</u> of sin we must overcome and live in the peace that Jesus gives.

He overcame the world, (John 16:33) and whoever is born of God overcomes the world, and our faith is the victory (1 John 5:4).

Since Adam, there is a major lie. To those who do not receive the love of the truth, God will send them a strong delusion that they may believe **THE LIE**, (2 Thess 2:5-11). The "lie" covers all that Satan is about, but **the heart of the lie is: "a life lived separate from God is to be preferred**."

Unfortunately, a believer can live and set about to manage his own life independently of God. His focus in life may center on achievement, personal goals, and producing financial security—but done independently of God.

None of these are wrong in themselves; they become wrong when done in our own strength independently of God.

For the believer who is in "the fray" he has the daily struggle to survive the work world, keep his standing before people, accomplish with a sense of importance, and experience satisfaction.

<u>Question</u>: how do we live above the fray? <u>Answer</u>: enter God's rest, For he that is entered into his rest, he also has ceased from his own works, as God did from his (Heb 4:10 KJV). So the believer has stopped "trying to **MAKE** it happen" in his own power; he has stopped trying to out-figure the odds for the future and has settled into a lifestyle of obedience to God's principles, and leaves the outcome in God's hands. When being obedient, it is amazing how many times things look like a loss, but the Lord brings them to a good end.

We re-enter the fray when we start trying **to control the outcome of things** in our lives. The victorious believer follows the Lord in obedience, acting on His principles of truth. We walk in wisdom, make decisions, and live in a responsible and moral way, but trust Him with the outcome.

Usually fear causes us to start trying to control the outcome, which pushes us into the fray. When real fear grips a person he has the sense that no one is in control—he isn't, no authority is, and God isn't.

When no one is in control, and if something isn't done, I will suffer major loss. The next conclusion is, "No one else is taking care of me, so I am going to have to do it myself."

To live above the fray the victory is not a matter of the letter of the law, because the Law is rigid, cold, impersonal, and deadly. Where the Law gives no room to

move beyond the exact letter, grace gives plenty of room to move. Living in the believer's rest removes sin consciousness in our lives, because all sins of human limitation, ignorance, weakness, and any misinformation are continually being cleansed by our **relationship** in His grace and mercy.

Look at the three parts of this verse on overcoming: And they overcame him (1) by the blood of the Lamb and by the (2) word of their testimony, and they (3) did not love their lives to the death (Rev 12:11 NKJV). For most believers, not doing the third one puts us back in the fray.

Using a soldier as an illustration: if fear grips him deeply enough, he will forget his responsibility as a soldier; he will forget the protection of his buddies, forget the cause for which he is fighting, and will run for his life. So it can be with a believer when fear grips him deeply enough.

The three Hebrews lived by part three when they loved not their lives to the death,

"O Nebuchadnezzar ... our God whom we serve is able to deliver us from the burning fiery furnace ... But if not, let it be known to you, O king, that we do not serve your gods, nor will we worship the gold image which you have set up" (Dan 3:16-18 NKJV).

Are you in the fray? If you have the power to change something that needs to change, do it, but if it is beyond your power, make the decision to release the outcome and place it in God's hand.

If we walk in wisdom and make decisions that agree with God's ways, we are at our best for things to turn out to our good and God's glory.  $\heartsuit$  (by Vernon Hedge)
